Full-Tuition Scholarship

Dutchess Community College is pleased to offer the Charles E. and Mabel E. Conklin Scholarship for Academic Excellence to Dutchess County students who graduate in the top 10% of their class. The scholarship offers two years of full tuition to qualifying students. You may qualify for this scholarship if:

- You are a Dutchess County resident graduating in June from a New York state approved high school in Dutchess County, New York or a high school designated by New York for Dutchess County residents;
- Your rank, as calculated by your high school, is in the top 10% of your graduating class. Your high school must calculate your grade point average on the basis of your high school career through the 12th grade, mid-year point.
- · You place into college-level English and math.

The deadline to apply is July 15. Call the Admissions Office at (845) 431-8010 to obtain an application for the Conklin Scholarship or go to www.sunydutchess.edu/admissions.

Live on Campus

On-campus housing is available for full-time students. Conklin Hall's fully furnished suites include two bathrooms, a living room and kitchenette. Students from counties other than Dutchess and Putnam must have a high school average of at least 75 in order to be eligible to live in the residence hall. Those who do not meet the academic requirements may attend DCC but not live on campus until completing at least one full-time semester and demonstrating satisfactory progress. Transfer students must have a 2.0 GPA to be considered for housing.

■ Submit Transcripts: Request that your high school transcript, GED or HSE scores, AP scores and/or college transcripts be sent to the Dutchess Community College Admissions Office. Official high school transcripts may be mailed or faxed to (845) 431-8605 if accompanied by an official cover sheet from the high school guidance office.

☐ Apply for Financial Aid: Students wishing to be considered for financial aid must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. A student can apply for the New York State Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) by completing the application at www.tapweb.org. NYS residents also should complete the Excelsior Scholarship application.

☐ Take Placement Test: If you are a new college student, you will be sent information about taking our placement test.

Students may have portions of this test waived based on high school or college grades.

Apply for Housing: Students interested in living in our suite-style residence hall should visit www.sunydutchess.edu/reslife to learn more about this opportunity and when to apply online, using your myDCC account.

■ Meet with an Academic Coach: Upon acceptance, students will be contacted by the ACT Center. The advisement and registration process includes meeting with an Academic Coach to review your program and schedule courses, visiting Financial Services and obtaining a student ID card from Security.

Request Immunization Records: Students taking six or more credits who were born on or after January 1, 1957 must submit proof of immunity to measles, mumps and rubella in order to register for classes. Your records may be faxed to (845) 431-8504.

Transfer degree for those interested in nonclinical healthcare positions in government agencies, hospitals and other settings

Phlebotomist Certificate (PDC)

Work in outpatient blood-drawing centers, clinical laboratories, physician offices, blood donor collection offices

Designed to prepare students for professional practice as a Registered Nurse (RN); Open to Dutchess and Putnam county residents only

Students who do not reside in Dutchess or Putnam county should take pre-requisites under Liberal Arts & Sciences Program (LAH) for successful transfer.
